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Guided Pathways for STEM Program Expectations

The Guided Pathways for STEM (GPS) program holds GPS Scholars to the highest level of academic and professional excellence. GPS scholars are a representation of the GPS program, not only in their classes, but in the academic institutions and communities. Scholars are always expected to perform to their highest potential. Achieving excellence will always be the goal of the GPS program. GPS Scholars are expected to push towards academic achievement and respect the following expectations in order to ensure a quality educational experience.

Academic Expectations

- a) Possess a positive attitude towards learning.
- b) Attend, be prepared, and actively participate in each class session. In case of emergency, students must notify the instructor.

In October 2021, California State University, Dominguez Hills (CSUDH) was awarded a five-year grant from the U.S. Department of Education to develop a program that increases the number of Hispanic and low-income students earning STEM undergraduate degrees. You are asked to participate in this evaluation conducted by the Center for Innovation in STEM Education (CISE) at CSUDH in conjunction with Vital Research (Vital), an independent research and evaluation consulting company (www.vitalresearch.com). You were selected as a possible participant in this evaluation because you were enrolled as a freshman student at CSUDH or one of the four partner community colleges (Compton Community College, Los Angeles Harbor College, West Los Angeles College, and Los Angeles Southwest College).

Purpose of the Study

This study seeks to investigate how to best support Hispanic and low-income students who are pursuing a STEM degree. In particular, we are looking for ways to improve student experiences and success by providing 1) student-centered support for basic needs, 2) other services, 3) an academic bridge program, 4) proactive advising, 5) pre-enrollment advising, and 6) support for credit transfer from community colleges.

What does participation involve?

GPS students will complete several short surveys each year administered by Vital Research asking you about your perceptions of various program components, coursework experience, and future expectations. GPS Staff will also be conducting exit surveys after some events and may also ask you to complete short interest surveys throughout the year. Your responses are confidential and will only be reported together with all other responses. Your individual responses will never be identified as yours.

You may also be asked to participate in a focus group that will take place with GPS students about once a year, conducted by Vital. These focus groups, which will ask about your ideas and experiences with the GPS program, will take approximately 45-60 minutes and might be audio recorded and transcribed for the evaluation. But, again, as with the survey data, no individual responses will be identified.

Data from the surveys will be linked to demographic, course enrollment, and graduation data collected by CSUDH Institutional Research (IR) as well as program participation data collected by the GPS staff. These data will be compiled and managed by Vital, the external evaluation consulting company, and this information will also only be reported in aggregate or summary form. Individuals will never be identified.

Who can participate?

All freshmen at CSUDH and the four partner community colleges (Compton Community College, Los Angeles Harbor College, West Los Angeles College, and Los Angeles Southwest College) are eligible to participate in the GPS program and therefore the evaluation study.

Potential risks and discomforts

There are no anticipated risks or discomforts associated with your participation in this study.

Potential benefits to subjects or society

While you may or may not directly benefit from your participation in this evaluation, it is expected that the results will contribute to improving the undergraduate experience and success at CSUDH in the future.

Will I receive any payment if I participate in this study? No, you will not receive any payment for participation.

Will information about me and my participation be kept confidential?

Your participation in this study is completely confidential. All information will be linked through an identification (ID) number, and your name, if used in any way to link various files, will be removed from all files before any data is analyzed. Files with personally identifiable information will be stored on a secure server and will be destroyed at the end of this evaluation.

What are my rights if I take part in this study?

Participation in this study is completely voluntary. If you choose to participate, you may leave the study at any time without penalty or loss of benefits to which you were otherwise entitled. Your participation in this evaluation study will have no bearing on any aspect of your CSUDH experience, including your ability to participate in GPS activities. You are not waving any of your legal rights if you choose to be in this evaluation study. You may refuse to answer any questions that you do not want to answer and remain in the evaluation study.

CLASS REGISTRATION PROCESS

Every STEM student has a hold placed on their account before every semester. A hold is just a code placed on your record that can prevent registration. To get your advising hold removed, you'll need to see a major advisor and then proceed with registration. You may also clear the hold through another advisor within the same department, if you're not able to make an appointment on time with your major advisor.

Here's how the registration process works:

- Registration begins with a fixed time frame based upon your student type, called a registration "appointment." It is the best opportunity to select your classes with the widest options for dates and times to meet your schedule.
- Before registration begins, each eligible student will receive an email from the University Registrar letting you know your registration appointment times are available via my.CSUDH.edu.
- You can view registration information by logging into your my.CSUDH.edu account and clicking on the Student Center tab. Check it regularly to see when your appointment for registration has been set.
- It is very important to review all the information, to take the appropriate action to correct inaccurate information, and to seek advising or clear other holds several working days prior to your registration appointment date and time.
- You won't be able to register before your appointment time, but you can register any time after your appointment time. It's a good idea to add your desired classes in your cart so that you won't have to search for classes when your registration appointment arrives.
- Check your ToroMail regularly for important registration related information.

Class Permission Numbers:

During registration, you may be unable to register for classes due to requisites and/or required departmental consent. To obtain access to these restricted classes, request a Permission Number from the department offering the class (see department chairs below). Each department will maintain Permission Numbers for their restricted classes. These numbers do not override the enrollment limit for classes. If the restricted class is full, you must select another class (and obtain another Permission Number) or you may waitlist for the class using the Permission Number. Use the Class Number and the Permission Number to add the class. Permission Numbers can only be used once and must be used prior to the first day of classes.

To add a class during the first week of late registration, you must obtain a Late Registration Permission Number from the instructor or department offering the class. Late Registration Permission Numbers override requisites and required departmental consent, but do not override enrollment capacity. Use the Late Registration Permission Number and the Class Number to add the class. Late Registration Permission Numbers can only be used once, and once they are used, they are tied to a specific student and ID number.


